The NHWA Community Funding Program for 2013

Applications will open for the 2013 NHWA Community Funding Program on 2nd August 2013 and close 5pm 30th August 2013.

What is the NHWA Community Funding Program?

The Neighbourhood Watch Australasia CFP is in its second year and has been created to:

- continue to engage and strengthen local communities in relation to crime prevention and community safety;
- promote the exchange of information and further build partnerships between the police, local communities and government;
- enabling safer and vibrant communities.

What is the 2013 funding for?

The 2013 funds will be focused on dealing with incidents of anti social behaviour in communities. Applications received that focus on dealing with or educating your local community with a focus on anti social behaviour caused or influenced by alcohol misuse are desirable.

In our Australasian Community Survey, you told us that the issues you would most like to address in your community where:

- Speeding and Hooning
- Burglary and Theft
- Vandalism and Graffiti
- Litter
- Alcohol juvenile delinquency
- Loud music and Parties

What can I do in my community?

We would like you to facilitate the development of a community initiative aimed at improving your community safety and reducing and preventing crime and the fear of crime. Through this initiative we would like you to promote community participation and a shared responsibility for community safety through the exchange of information and partnership building between you and your local police.

If you get together with members in your street/neighbourhood to address anti social behaviours or crime that is affecting you all, then it will help strengthen your communities capacity to create local solutions for local problems.

We will be publishing on line some information and resources that will help get you started!

Funding amounts and time periods

Funds will be available to a maximum of \$3,000 per application for your community to develop and implement community safety and crime prevention initiatives. Funding applications for small grants of under \$1,000 are encouraged. Your initiative can be for more than six months in duration, but funding will not be provided for more than 6 months.

Who is eligible to apply to the NHWA Community Funding Program?

All applicants must be either:

- A NHW incorporated not-for-profit organisation OR
- An organisation sponsoring an unincorporated NHW not-for-profit organisation OR
- A Local Government Authority working in partnership with NHW OR
- A Member on behalf of an Australian Police Force/Service working in partnership with community.

NHW ACT in this centenary year 2013

2013 marks 100 years since Lady Denman, the wife of the then Governor-General Lord Denman, announced the name of the new Australian capital: Canberra. The Centenary of Canberra is a year-long program of events which showcase the capital's history and help to tell the story of a capital city designed for all Australians.

HW ACT is participating in the centenary celebrations in a number of ways, including providing a NHW presence at events such as the Canberra Show. NHW areas across Canberra are planning to include historical information about their suburbs in newsletters and other materials. The NHW ACT Board of Management has commissioned a project to explore and record the history of NHW in Canberra.

The Dunlop and Charnwood NHW areas will be among the first areas to run a newsletter feature about their suburbs' history. "Although our suburb is quite young in comparison to many parts of Canberra, we think that there is still some interesting history to be found," said Dr Judi Reardon, Area Coordinator of Dunlop and NHW ACT Deputy President. "We hope that by presenting something of the history of the suburb, we can help to foster a community feeling - an ownership of the suburb." Ms Yvonne Lipscombe, Area Coordinator of Charnwood agrees, "We want to present our suburb in a positive way -



we want people to feel a sense of place."

NHW ACT has a 30 year history in Canberra, and has steadily grown from small beginnings in 1984. The organisation now has area committees in many parts of Canberra and enjoys excellent relations with the

Australian Federal Police. "Even though we are a young organisation when compared with Canberra's 100 year history, we think that now is the time to explore and record our history," said Ms Margaret Pearson, President NHW ACT.



"2014 will be our 30 year anniversary and we have commissioned a project to record the history of our organisation. We can celebrate our history and at the same time look forward to the role NHW ACT can play in the ACT community in the future."

Canberra has seen many changes since its establishment in 1913 as the national capital. The Canberra population, now approximately 300,000 people, is bigger than the population originally envisaged for the city. Canberra has grown as a capital at the same time as changes in technology, society, and culture has shaped Australia as a nation.

NHW ACT has, for part of Canberra's long history, been a part of helping the citizens of Canberra with the neighbourhood challenges that have arisen over time. The Board of NHW ACT is now looking forward to helping Canberrans for the next 30 years.

Sarah Trinne (NT Police Regional Communications Media Officer) and Acting Superintendent Michael Hebb (NT Executive member of NHW Australasia) departed Darwin on a road trip to Katherine, Tennant Creek and Alice Springs.

This travel provided a much needed opportunity for face to face engagement with local Police, non Government organisations and various service providers. These engagements enabled updates to be provided about NHW at NT and Australasia levels and identified key persons and organisations at local levels to garner support for future projects and growth of both NHWNT and NHWA.

NTEIPP aim is to reduce the harms related to alcohol and other substances for young people through partnerships with Police and Community Services. The program runs monthly workshops in Darwin, Katherine, Alice Springs

and surrounding areas. Through this joint trip, plenty of opportunities were identified for NHWNT and NTEIPP programs to work in partnership.

NHWNT discussed the three Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED) courses that will be held for all interested NHW members throughout the Territory in 2013.

Darwin 27-28 May, Katherine 30-31 May and Alice Springs 03-04 June. Trained members will then be able to provide safety audits to their local community and discuss issues regarding safety in their community. This program will include working with other agencies such as Victims of Crime NT, who will provide referrals to the program.

However, with so many distractions it's easy to become complacent about your own safety.

SAPOL has recognised this with a 12-week Summer Safety campaign to reassure and protect the community by providing practical hints and tips to keep residents and visitors safe throughout summer.

Running until 22 February 2013, the campaign involved weekly fact sheets available on the SAPOL website and the promotion of practical crime prevention messages on Facebook and Twitter.

"We appreciate that for many South Australians summer is a time of festivities, fun and family holidays but the change in behaviour can see us forget the basics of safety, drinking in moderation and taking care of the people and things that we value," said the Officer in Charge of Community Relations Section, Superintendent Ashley Lange.

"Police always want people to enjoy themselves but to stay safe. That means planning ahead, not drinking and driving, watching

out for your mates and keeping your family and belongings safe both at home and while enjoying the outdoors."

The Summer Safety campaign provided valuable tips for partying safely over the Christmas and New Year period as well as helpful advice about beach and water safety, home security, and drinking smarter this summer.

"SAPOL puts out messages all year round to empower people to protect themselves from being a target of crime," Superintendent Lange said.

"These targeted safety messages have been specifically tailored and timed to match the changing facets of the summer period and remind the public of the key summer safety themes."

The Summer Safety tips and crime prevention messages were positively received by SAPOL's 86 000 Facebook friends and more than 9300 Twitter followers, with the campaign reaching an overall weekly audience in excess of 200 000 across all of SAPOL's media platforms.

"The use of social media has injected a fresh and contemporary angle to crime prevention, potentially delivering the key messages to a younger and broader audience," Superintendent Lange said.

Turning up the heat on anti-social behaviour

Throughout the summer period SAPOL's Summer Safety campaign worked in tandem with both local and national operations, such as Operation Unite (a multi-jurisdiction joint effort to crack down on alcohol-fuelled violence), together with specific Local Service Area (LSA) beach and traffic operations to ensure a consistent, proactive message.

Covering the coastline from Christies Beach through to Sellicks Beach. Operation Foreshore focused on responsible alcohol consumption, appropriate behaviour and road safety on and around beaches in South Coast LSA.



"We dedicated our Uniform Tactical Team to this operation and utilised uniform patrols to provide an overt police presence at beaches," said South Coast LSA Operations Manager, Chief Inspector Rob Williams.

With a much hotter summer than last year, combined with Australia Day celebrations and a stage of the Tour Down Under in the LSA, the southern beaches attracted larger visitor numbers than usual.

"A significant police strategy involving controlling beach access, alcohol and drug testing of drivers leaving the beach and a strong

police presence was crucial in successfully managing these events," Chief Inspector Williams said.

"Throughout summer police also focused on south coast beaches. particularly the popular Moana and Aldinga locations where vehicles are allowed on the sand, to ensure members of the public conduct themselves safely."

Now in its third year, Operation Beach Safe has seen a year-on-year reduction in crime along the Glenelg foreshore and surrounding areas.

Running until March 2013, the operation targeted public displays of anti-social and violent behaviour. using a combination of foot patrols, mounted operations and officers on bicycles and trail bikes.

"Operation Beach Safe is about preventing criminal behaviour to ensure Glenelg and other beach communities provide a safe, enjoyable, family friendly environment," said Officer in Charge of Sturt LSA, Superintendent Tom Rieniets.

"Police received positive feedback from the local council, ratepayers and general public, including many tourists who appreciated the visible police presence."

New avenues for Neighbourhood policing

A strong commitment to policing at a local level is paying rich dividends in suburbia, with visible and accessible Neighbourhood Policing Teams (NPT) providing an effective and proactive response to community needs.

stablished on a trial basis in 2010, the South Coast Local Service Area (LSA) NPT has now been made permanent and expanded into two teams (Christies Beach and Aldinga) covering a total of seven southern suburbs.

"We have received strong feedback from locals who are appreciative of our efforts in reducing crime and making people feel safe," said Christies Beach NPT Supervisor, Sergeant Russell Stone.

"The concept has been embraced by our local partners such as Onkaparinga Council and Housing SA. Our community-based problem solving approach is working - a recent community meeting led to the targeting of specific offenders in Hackham West, resulting in a reduction in various offences."

Neighbourhood policing has also been a hit with locals in Elizabeth LSA.

"The NPT trial in the Playford Council area was very successful with many positive outcomes in terms of community safety, crime levels and anti-social behaviour," said Officer in Charge of Elizabeth LSA, Superintendent David O'Donovan.

"It has now been made permanent, with police officers dedicated to Davoren Park, Elizabeth Downs and the Munno Para and Smithfield areas."

Northern exposure

This success has spawned a new team of five officers who are increasing police visibility and building closer relationships with residents in the Salisbury Council area.

Led by Sergeant Tarvn Trevelion, the Salisbury NPT has been serving the suburbs of Paralowie, Salisbury North, Parafield Gardens and Mawson Lakes since June 2012.

"The team has been well received by the local community, with many expressing their enthusiasm for the concept," Sergeant Trevelion said.

"We have received positive feedback in terms of people's perception of safety in the community as a result of constructive interactions they have had with team members."

Although still in its infancy, the Salisbury NPT has wasted no time in identifying key issues in each suburb and problem solving at the grass roots level to prevent incidents such as motor vehicle crime, house break-ins and property damage in the form of vandalism and graffiti.

"We're also involved in partnerships with various agencies to address the causes of ongoing neighbourhood disputes rather than just treating the outcomes of these issues," Sergeant Trevelion said.

"Team members have worked closely with Housing SA on several occasions to help resolve issues involving disruptive tenants. This has resulted in the eviction of some residents where entrenched problems existed."

Salisbury NPT members are continuing to develop close working relationships with community groups, government agencies, local businesses and schools.

"Our proactive approach is helping to identify community needs and relevant issues where police can take effective action to help provide a safe environment for the public to live, work and play," Sergeant Trevelion said.

"The NPT is also actively supporting an extension of the Safety Assist program in Mawson Lakes as there are currently only two Safety Assist houses in the area."

The two teams within Elizabeth LSA are reaping the benefits of being both on the beat and online, with a strong presence on the LSA's Facebook page.

According to Superintendent O'Donovan, exposure on Facebook has helped to personalise the presence of the teams within the community.

"The page has attracted a large number of followers. People have supplied police with valuable information via Facebook posts, which has led to numerous crimes being solved," he said.

"Online content is an effective policing tool as it reaches a greater audience and initiates real-time responses from the public thereby enabling faster action to be taken."

On the western front

The popularity of neighbourhood policing has extended into the western suburbs, with a new Neighbourhood Policing Team (NPT) established in Western Adelaide LSA.

The team of five, led by Sergeant Michelle Hollis, is based at Parks Police Station and divides its time between Seaton, Royal Park, Brompton, Bowden and Ovingham. It also covers the Woodville and Semaphore areas.

Since its inception in June 2012, the team has been concentrating on eliminating crime such as graffiti, vandalism and hoon driving, while establishing strong partnerships with residents. businesses and schools in the local community.

"Each area has its own specific policing issues, from motor vehicle crime in Brompton and juvenile

offences in the Semaphore area. to drug offences and offending in licensed premises in Royal Park and Seaton," Sergeant Hollis said.

"NPT members pay particular attention to their areas and use their local knowledge to identify offenders, leading to more apprehensions."

While it's still early days, the team has already achieved some significant outcomes.

Recently, a routine traffic stop located stolen property in a vehicle, resulting in the arrest of a male for Operation Alchemy offences and the recovery of \$25 000 worth of stolen property from building sites, including a Bobcat used in a recent series of crimes," Sergeant Hollis said.

Local businesses have already seen the value in the personalised, visible policing model.

"We recently attended the Semaphore Road Working Group meeting to discuss concerns raised about graffiti occurring after hours and homeless persons begging in the street," said Constable Emma Woodhouse, who serves the Semaphore area.

"I was able to take appropriate action to reduce the number of reports of individuals begging in the area. Throughout the busy summer period I have continued to liaise with shop owners to ensure any local issues are effectively dealt with."

Constable Woodhouse has also successfully investigated a series of deception issues that were occurring in Semaphore hotels.

"Many of these incidences had not been reported to police, but as a result of the growing confidence in police, our extensive enquiries and assistance from local residents. I was able to identify and arrest the offender," she said.

The Western Adelaide NPT has also been positively engaging with local schools, particularly Woodville and Le Fevre high schools.

"School principals have requested our presence at re-entry meetings when students have been excluded. This has been extremely well received by parents of these students - they are appreciative of the way in which the school and

police have been working together to address the situation," Sergeant Hollis said.

Principal of Woodville High School, Meredith Edwards, sees a lot of merit in establishing a close working relationship with local police.

"As an accredited School Watch site. Woodville High School has benefited from a close relationship with SAPOL's School Liaison Officers. This has now been strengthened by effective support from neighbourhood policing officers," she said.

"After only a few months in the partnership, officers have assisted the school to support students in making safer choices for themselves and others

"Schools are an integral part of any community, so it's a huge advantage to have the Neighbourhood Policing Team as a valued member of our proactive network which aims to keep young people and their communities safe and resilient."

held soon after the southern fires identified that we could and should help. We wanted to act sooner. rather than later. Calls to the two Community Houses in the area found that their immediate needs were being met, but perhaps further down the track when re-vegetation projects commence and community gardens are established there may be a way for us to help out these communities financially.

I made contact with Lola from Nubeena Neighbourhood Watch to see if they needed any help.

Their members were busy preparing for the Peninsula Feast at Nubeena - a great contribution to their local community.

I then heard about a thank you event being planned by a local radio station where all the people involved in bringing the fires under control, both paid and volunteer, would be invited and the public could thank them for their efforts. We discussed a range of ways in which we could support this activity, eventually settling on a cash donation towards the running of the event.

The City of Gosnells model has experienced great success that has generated wide interest


throughout Western Australia, resulting in the need for a state-wide roll out.

The site is in the final development phase and will be pilot tested this April in two police districts to ensure it is user friendly for police and Local Government administrators as well as being engaging and valuable to the Western Australian community.

After the site has been thoroughly tested and evaluated to ensure it is technically sound, easy to operate and successfully engaging the community, a state-wide roll out throughout the remaining 12 Western Australian Police districts will commence. The ewatch program has gained strong corporate support in both the regional and metropolitan areas throughout the state which has confirmed WA Police's commitment to statewide implementation.

Working together as a community helps to make your neighbourhood safe, secure and vibrant for all who share it. Community interaction is a shared responsibility that has proven positive towards building a safer community, preventing crime and developing community spirit.
