

Pat Leary - President

to print leaflets in their language promoting NHW.

By example Philip has encouraged over 4,700 residents to become involved in NHW. He has set up three Assistant Coordinators one for each area as well as over 60 newsletter delivery personnel.

Philip regularly meets with local members of the public to ascertain their concerns and advises members of Council whilst continuing to espouse the merits of NHW. He personally has garnished support from local businesses as sponsors and partners to contribute finances to offset the cost of the newsletter and associated running costs. Philip and his committee have plans in train to expand into another five adjacent defunct areas in cooperation with the local residents of Denistone East, Ryde and West Ryde, the police and local government. Currently he is busy setting up a long term strategy to insure that all concerned parties are on board so that failure is not an option.

Philip was employed for over 44 years with the Electricity Commission of NSW, which became Pacific Power and later Transgrid. He resigned in 2011 as a Senior Public Servant but continues to live an active life within the local community.

Neighbourhood Support New Zealand A 2014 overview

Roger Eynon, Chief Executive Officer, Neighbourhood Support New Zealand

It's interesting sitting down to write an overview of a year that has nearly passed. I can still remember how I opened up 2014 with progressing ideas for the future that came out of my Christmas leave period and January thinking. I have had a number of epiphany moments during my six and a half years. That period and the months since have continued along that path.

knew that this year would serve up the milestone managing a funding programme for the Ministry of Justice for the fourth consecutive year. I watched as other organisations struggled to do what NSNZ found was comfortable accomplishing although I wouldn't say it was easy. NSNZ is now on the cusp of delivering \$1 million

of investment into Neighbourhood Support in the community and for those who chose to be applicants; they too have learned how accessing funding has changed. There is emphasis on alignment of local outcomes to NSNZ contracted outcomes, as well as actually possessing the detail required to access funds in terms

of today, rather than what was the standard going back five or six years. Times have indeed changed.

Fund management

In 2011, NSNZ introduced a real challenge for Neighbourhood Support Areas to succeed in securing funds that we managed. It was not universally well received, which was fair enough and we saw that coming. Four years on, the environment closely mirrors the stringent but logical set of criteria we put in place back then. We saw that coming too.

We also sailed through our third consecutive audit by KPMG without issue. Our audit for the year 2012-13 was included within our tender for funds from the Ministry of Justice for the current period. The material we presented, along with robust references and the positive audit we worked hard to achieve, paid dividends and we were awarded the maximum amount available, without a single additional question being asked of us. In essence, this is a major part of our

business – it's not all of it, but it would not be an understatement to say that these points are crucial building blocks for our sustainability. Get it wrong and immediate options are severely limited.

Governance fit for the times

In February, our then Chair, Barry Hyde and I reflected on NSNZ itself. The end result was to propose to the Board and members to trial a refreshed structure, under a pilot period. That period is for 18 months. Long enough to attract and retain appropriate Board Members and to deliver. The reason for such thinking was that key Board roles were in the hands of locally elected people. When asked directly, those individuals stated that they really were not best placed to carry out a Board role. We identified that what we had were square pegs trying to fit into round holes. That's no one's fault but is the result of a constitutional right rather than a business need. It was clear that both exist in the same space but there was insufficient focus on the latter. Instead of a knee jerk reaction to change the constitution, a pilot period was agreed to demonstrate whether things could be done better, fairer and more reliably but retain district input and decision making. For the pilot period, NSNZ Board has reduced from 16 to 7 in number. I have been told that in making that decision alone, NSNZ has made itself more attractive for external parties to work with.


What else?

2014 exhibited NSNZ interests and tangible involvement with Auckland Council and Wellington City Council two of the biggest local authorities in New Zealand. Until 2011-12, we had no tangible connections with either.

Auckland Council, under the Community Development arm of their business, supports Neighbourhood Support. They also support Neighbours Day Aotearoa (NDA). We offered an opportunity for Council and Neighbourhood Support from Auckland, Counties Manukau and Waitemata Districts to collaborate and work towards the annual March date for Neighbours

Day by working through a joint approach to seize the opportunity of a Summer of Neighbourliness (for more information - refer to NDA website). An initial gathering focused on shared outcomes. All parties saw this as an opportunity to work together. For the record, 10 out of 12 Neighbourhood Support Districts were involved in NDA 2014 with at least 23 Neighbourhood Support Areas managing the actual delivery in a planned manner. Both parties have since met again and a joint approach with shared outcomes was drafted.

Wellington City Council (WCC) has been extremely supportive and tangible in their involvement. Neighbourhood

Support can look different in different places. Avoiding an inflexible and prescriptive approach has been very beneficial. NSNZ relationships are many. Our relations are a bit like a spider's web. We spin our threads into a web that we bounce up and down on rather than sit within. We are agile enough to move about and find the best place to sit and become integral to what best suits our aspirations.

NSNZ allocated funds to WCC to assist in progressing mutual beneficial outcomes. Their Community Development arm enlisted Massey University through the Design School and the end result has been something that only younger people could come up with. An approach conceived and delivered by young people, who find themselves in neighbourhoods for a short period, who find it difficult to be involved in or connected with the neighbourhood they are in. The outcome of this piece of work has turned heads and is a viable prospect outside of Wellington.

District Representative Forum and outcomes

We have just had our AGM. The way NSNZ meetings take place has changed hugely during this period. All came together for the AGM and a forum. With a reduction in governance duties, the time was utilised to demonstrate national opportunities, including a comprehensive

presentation on the progress and impact of Neighbourhood Policing Teams by Police (look up *Problem* Solving Policing on YouTube) and the introduction of a new tool that will provide appropriate information to Neighbourhood Support and similar organisations in a consistent manner. This tool is the result of NSNZ working with NZ Police. It will do an awful lot more than simply provide information to the community. It manages risk and Neighbourhood Support involvement will assist in up-skilling local Police. It's a win-win for all parties.

My colleague Supriya Rathod (NSNZ Community Partnerships and Development Manager) and I were invited to attend the Acknowledging

Volunteers event at the Fickling Community Centre in Three Kings. Auckland. We were invited because of our recognised diverse approach to Neighbourhood Support across the country. NSNZ had also allocated funds to assist in a new intake of Community Safety Ambassadors and supported the event in its own right. I witnessed not just the huge body of volunteers that participate but also how they valued our support. involvement and very modest allocation of the funds they needed. It turned out that our key funder was also present. I'm sure you can appreciate how important it is for the main financial supporter of NSNZ to see the loop close in front of them.

We know what the national body and national office are here to do. NSNZ is a connector and enabler. It exists not to duplicate what is being done locally, but to ensure that opportunities and the means to deliver opportunities are provided either directly or indirectly by us to grass roots Neighbourhood Support and continue to do so. We have to find the right pathway to provide opportunities and we have to ensure that *relevance* is a word known and understood by all.

NSNZ is well placed to influence and be influenced in a way that provides a clear steer for future planning, delivery and opportunity. We are also very aware of a simple three letter word that has to be evident within Neighbourhood Support and its activities. It's a simple word – FUN; short and sweet but not often spoken nearly enough.

Membership doubles in a year NHWNT "dynamic and vital", **AGM** hears

Neighbourhood Watch NT doubled its membership to 400 in the past year and more than 2,500 people followed it on line, the organisation's 2014 annual general meeting was told.

ree crime prevention workshops in three Territory centres, Safety House talks to more than 8,000 school children, a growing number of active volunteers and more community groups asking NHWNT to attend their events were among events highlighted.

NHWNT patron, Chief Justice Trevor Riley, told the AGM: "Neighbourhood Watch is a very dynamic and vital organisation. It is regarded highly in the community and has a very positive profile."

He said the success of NHWNT was demonstrated by doubling its membership. As well, there were about 50 people waiting to join, now being taken through the approval process.

NHWTNT had regional co-ordinators in Darwin, Katherine and Alice Springs. The position in Tennant Creek was yet to be filled.

The Safety House program had been reinvigorated, with a police officer appointed to co-ordinate it.

The program was not confined to private homes and about 40 businesses had signed up as Safety Houses, including one in Tennant Creek.

Chief Justice Riley congratulated NHWNT Support and Liaison Officer, Senior Constable Tracy-Dale Middleton, who recently received the Neighbourhood Watch Australasia Commissioner's Award for her dedication to crime prevention in the NT – the first NT police officer to receive this award.

He said those involved in NHWNT. the police officers, the board of management and the dedicated volunteers were all making a positive contribution to the community, helping people feel safe.

Police Acting Commissioner Reece Kershaw said since its establishment in 1988, Neighbourhood Watch around Australia had formed a strong partnership with police.

NHWNT had been working closely with police in a crime prevention pilot project in two Territory

communities - on the Tiwi Islands in the Top End and at Papunya in central Australia.

Mr Kershaw said having 2,550 people following NHWNT on Facebook was a "significant achievement".

Vicki Schultz. re-elected as NHWNT President, said "hundreds of others" subscribed to the organisation's emails and on-line newsletter.

She said: "The number of people who follow and contribute to NHWNT via Facebook has also doubled. This is a fantastic outcome and a direct result of the efforts and initiatives ... over the last year."

Free crime prevention workshops for NHW members were held in Darwin, Katherine and Alice Springs and a two-part workshop is coming up in Palmerston. The president thanked Ray Andersson for conducting these workshops voluntarily.

"Those who participated in this training are now able to conduct community safety audits to assist their local community to reduce the likelihood of crime occurring and the fear of crime - an ongoing benefit for the wider community," she said.

There had been a "substantial increase" in the number of community organisations requesting the presence of NHW at their events. Thanks to its volunteer base, the organisation had been able to meet these requests.

Ms Schultz said the board of management met monthly throughout the year in Darwin, including the Katherine and Alice Springs coordinators through teleconferencing.

She welcomed a new Southern Regional Co-ordinator, Lauren Winter, the first one in three years and thanked the Northern Regional Co-ordinator Judy Troy, regretting that the dedicated coordinator since 2012 had to return to WA.

The Safety House program continued to grow steadily, with a total of 116 Safety Houses throughout the Northern Territory and 8,000 children at 28 schools being told about the program.

The President announced a new UV

marker pen project, allowing people to identify property with a driver's licence or Medicare number, invisible except under a UV light – "a much easier alternative to engraving".

NHW Australasia NT representative. Senior Sergeant Troy Stephens, said in his report that NHWNT had been awarded a NHWA Community Grant to upgrade its present website to enable it to be responsive to smartphones and tablets.

Another NHWA Community Grant, the "Clean and Clear" project, created for the community of Wurrumiyanga on Bathurst Island, was awarded to Station Officer Matt Brookhouse of the NT Fire & Rescue Services. with full support from NHWNT.

This project's aim is to bring back the natural beauty, to get rid of the rubbish, so that rats, snakes, mosquitoes and disease will go away. Matt Brookhouse received the 2014 NHWA Commonwealth Minister of Justice's Innovation Award to recognise this innovative community project to promote safety and NHW values in the community. The award was selected through the NHWA Community Funding Program.

About 36 people attended the AGM on Thursday, November 6, at Paspalis Centrepoint on Darwin's Smith St Mall. A video streaming throughout the Territory was also provided for those unable to attend.

the palm of many hands - the mobile phone. Not just a means of making calls and texting any more but a total communication device. From a crime prevention and community safety

perspective, the ability to report realtime crime or to be made aware of real-time criminal activities is a captive way to engage younger generations in Neighbourhood Watch principles.



Neighbourhood Watch sets its directions in Victoria

ver the past year, NHW Victoria has developed its Strategic Plan 2013-2016 which is built upon the three pillars of Engagement, Education, and Partnerships. An Implementation Plan to execute these strategies has also been developed.

- Whilst **engagement** is a traditional role of NHW. in Victoria we have turned our attention to a broader range of groups in the community and different ways of interacting with the community.
 - For example, a NHW has been established at a public housing

estate in the inner suburb of Carlton where 2,000 people from 20 nationalities are concentrated in multi-storey buildings on a relatively small area of land#. Another project has started in the outer suburb of Dandenong, where 60% of the population was born

> overseas and most of these come from countries where English is not the main language.

- As with most community organisations, NHW in Victoria is moving to greater use of computer technology. For example, in the past year our active volunteer numbers have increased by 15% to 6,500. However, our online supporter numbers have doubled to 50,000 in this same period.
- Since it was established, a main function of NHW has been the education of the community on crime prevention.
 - Again we have developed better ways of educating the public including the use of diagrammatic brochures to assist people with English difficulties# and the use of a computer game for older primary school aged children#.
 - We have engaged a Victorianbased educational provider to develop a certified training program to teach leadership skills to people who are

becoming involved in some of the NHW programs.

- Over its history in our state, NHW has been in a strong partnership with Victoria Police. In recent times, this relationship has changed from NHW being subservient to the two organisations being equal partners. More importantly, NHW has developed partnerships with a number of other Government and corporate organisations.
- For example, NHW is being supported by radio stations in Melbourne and a TV station in Ballarat.
- In addition to local Government NHW has been working on joint projects with the State Emergency Service and the Country Fire Authority.
- NHW Victoria now has six Ambassadors drawn from the media, tourism and entertainment industries to advocate on our behalf throughout the community.

These projects are being supported by NHW Australasia

Since forming in 1980, Satterley Property Group has since become one of Australia's largest independently owned property development companies.

eighbourhood Watch WA first developed a relationship with Satterley through Shahan Hobson, the Community Development Coordinator for the South Metro district, by providing NHW bin stickers for Satterley residents.

Buying a block of land and building a house is one of the biggest decisions and financial outlays that a family can make. One priority for many new land buvers is that they are buving into a "safe community". This is where the NHW philosophy is closely aligned with the values that Satterley promotes in their residential estates. by creating an environment where people feel safe and feel connected to their community. Where people are proud of where they live and who have a sense of belonging in their community.

"The NHW philosophy is everything that our Satterley communities

strive to be and promote in order to become a safer community," Shahan said.

"They are all attributed to developing community spirit, getting to know your neighbours and having a sense of belonging In turn, hopefully, comes a reduction in crime. Our philosophy is that people don't want to just buy a block of land, they want to buy into a family friendly lifestyle in a safe healthy community and to have a sense of belonging. This is what the Satterley Community Development Program is about and we would love for our communities to continue to live by this in the future."


"One of the biggest ways for people to feel safe is through knowing the people that live in their street/ neighbourhood. We provide various opportunities throughout the year to ensure that residents have the chance to get out and meet each

other. We basically promote the NHW philosophy in every way that we can."

The NHW WA office provided a copy of the Knock Knock resource to Satterley as a communication tool that may benefit new home owners in their estates. The card was well received and has been developed to suit the needs of the individual estates.

"We loved the concept of the Knock Knock Cards developed by NHWA and saw that there would be many benefits to our new communities," Shahan said

"With NHW WA permission, we redeveloped the cards to align with each of our communities. We then distributed them to all houses within the community. In older neighbourhoods, over time you tend to meet your neighbours and form relationships with them. There is generally a "Mary and Bob" who



have lived in the street for years and act as the conduit for people to meet each other. In our new communities. EVERYONE is new and no one knows who is moving into their street. The Knock Knock cards were a great way to break the ice between neighbours and swap contact details. Knowing that you can contact someone in your street in a time of need is reassuring for new residents."

'The reaction to the cards from new residents has been positive. In one of the estates there was

a great uptake of the cards. At a local community meeting the card was shown to over 100 residents and all of them requested that the cards be delivered again as many of them were new since they were last distributed."

Overall, Satterley is well on their way to creating connected, safe and cohesive communities.

"The more opportunities people have to meet up and chat, the more they are working out where they all live in relation to each other which is great. Most people tend to

know their neighbours enough to wave as they drive by, but we want to take it further. We want them to feel comfortable to knock on their neighbour's door and ask for a cup of sugar, to bring in the neighbours bins or collect their mail, or simply keep an eye on their place while they are away."

Neighbourhood Watch WA plans to introduce the Knock Knock card to other land developers in WA with the hope the resource is picked up and adapted for other residential land estates.



ThinkUKnow Partners with Neighbourhood Watch Australasia



On 11 February 2014 Neighbourhood Watch Australasia joined the ThinkUKnow Australia Program; a partnership between the Australian Federal Police, Microsoft and Datacom that provides free, evidence-based cyber safety and security sessions to all Australians.

hinkUKnow was originally developed in the United Kingdom by the Child Exploitation and Online Protection Centre in 2006 and was piloted in Australia in 2009.

The program sees industry partner with law enforcement agencies including the Australian Federal Police, Northern Territory Police Force. Queensland Police Service. South Australia Police. Tasmania Police and Western Australia Police, educating people to protect themselves and their families online. The program offers

free presentations to parents, carers and teachers after hours through schools or community groups across Australia with an emphasis on child protection.

With more than 17.3 million mobile phone subscribers and some of the highest rates of social media use Australians are becoming increasingly interconnected. The most vulnerable point in any technology is human behaviour so we must encourage people to learn how to protect themselves and make the most of what technology has to offer them.
